

### **CATTLE ON 'THE MARSH'**

Rightly, many villagers have been concerned about cattle on 'The marsh', and the matter has generated much Facebook comment. All the land beyond the main marsh gate at the bottom of Marsh Road has long been referred to generically as 'The marsh', but the reality is that 'The marsh' is divided between Halling Common (owned by Halling village, and over which Halling Parish Council (HPC) has control), and Kent Wildfowlers' private land over which HPC has no control.

It's true that cattle were on Halling Common recently without HPC authorisation. The farmer (not Mr Andrew Lingham, who no longer has cattle) promptly herded them back to Wildfowlers' ground from which they had escaped through a riverside gate left open. That was on Monday, 3rd December.

On Tuesday, 4th December, it was erroneously reported on Facebook that the cattle were again on 'The marsh'. They were not. It seems a technicality, but the cattle were not (on Tuesday, 4th December) on HPC's Halling Common to which it is only too easy to refer to as 'The marsh'.

The cattle were – are – still contained within the Wildfowlers' private ground on which the new farmer has been granted temporary grazing rights. The controversy is complicated by the public footpaths. A section of one footpath, the RS320, must cross Wildfowlers' ground. A part of another riverside footpath, the RS319, skirts Wildfowlers' ground until it reaches a containing stile which marks the beginning of Halling Common. Yes, cattle are on those sections of the two public footpaths, but the cattle have not been prevented from making easy and damaging access to the paths by the landowner.

A missed chance still rued was not having the deciding Chairman of the successful legal tussle between HPC and Kent Wildfowlers order, there and then, that the newly won back footpath across private ground was fenced off from cattle. The path had been closed arbitrarily by the Wildfowlers when they bought the ground some 8 years prior to the judicial hearing. Of course, the positive outcome was that people could once again walk the paths all the way round 'The marsh' as they had done for 50 years and more, even though the walk now crosses and skirts Wildfowlers' land.

Regretfully, there is nothing that can be done – yet – to have the cattle kept from gaining access to public footpaths on Wildfowlers' ground. The cattle have hugely churned up the footpaths after so much wet weather. Currently, the paths are a nightmare to walk.

A recently completed survey commissioned by Medway Council asked for reports on all the public footpaths in all Medway parishes, and this has put the focus on problems for walkers. HPC has been advised to seek free permission to publish a specially adapted Ordnance Survey map (normally protected by copyright) as a double-page spread in future Halling Views which details all our footpaths within Halling's surprisingly far-flung boundaries, and the paths' official RS numbers. This will be helpful and informative for everyone.

Medway Council's Rivers & Paths Manager has already acted on Halling's response to the survey by having his volunteer team start installing new steps and a firm hand-rail just beyond the marsh gate, and at the start of the Halling Common section of RS320.

HPC has improvement plans not only for 'The marsh', but also for other parts of the village. With certainty, we can say that for 'the marsh' there are plans for wide, metal kissing-gates in selected locations for people to gain easy access to Halling Common and walk paths without the current need to climb stiles.

Everyone in Halling refers (even if not quite accurately) to the whole area beyond the marsh gate as 'The marsh', but we hope this explanation of why the cattle are not on 'The marsh' (but on Wildfowlers' ground) clarifies matters!

### **RIGHTS OF WAY IMPROVEMENT PLAN (ROWIP)**

The Rights of Way Improvement Plan (ROWIP) is an important statutory document which sets out how rights of way will be managed.

It is required by legislation (the Countryside and Rights of Way Act), which also sets out what it must cover. The plan must include an assessment of:

The extent to which local rights of way meet the present and likely future needs of the public

The opportunities provided by local rights of way for exercise and other recreation and enjoyment

Accessibility of rights of way to blind, partially sighted and others with mobility problems

#### A new ROWIP

Medway Council are producing a new Rights of Way Improvement Plan (ROWIP) to replace the existing plan which is now over ten years old. An important part of this update is to get the views of people who use the rights of way network.

#### The ROWIP team wanted to hear from you

To complete the assessment and the ROWIP, the team has been gathering information. You were invited to share your views through an online survey the link for which was included the last Halling View and we hope that many of you completed the survey.

#### **Workshops**

A workshop for parish council representatives and interested members of the public was held for **Halling and Cuxton Parishes** on Tuesday, 25 September 2018 in the Halling Community Centre and representatives from HPC attended with members of the public to see a presentation and to identify areas that needed to be addressed within the boundaries of Halling.

#### The active part

In order to complete the ROWIP, 10% of Medway's 350km of rights of way need to be surveyed. The recently retired HPC's co-opted member for Footpaths put his walking boots on and personally walked and completed a survey report for all the footpaths in Halling except for one which he left for me to do.

The ROWIP Consultant supplied A1 copies of an Ordinance Survey map for Cuxton and Halling which had been overprinted with all the footpaths and walks in the area. This has be used to generate a quality map of Halling which will become available to use once the required permissions have been obtained and this is work in progress and it should be completed for the next issue of Halling View.

#### What happens after the survey is completed

Actions resulting from the ROWIP will include a new 10 year plan to guide us on how we can best serve residents and visitors who use the network.

The ROWIP will provide Medway Council with new aims and aspirations:

A better understanding of the needs of all users

Identify improvements needed

Target which paths to increase accessibility

Improve signage where needed

Take forward new circular routes and promotion for urban and rural areas

Attract more people to use this fantastic resource.

### **CHRISTMAS CATCHES UP!**

Christmas has rather caught me out this year! It's partly the wonderful Autumn weather lasting into October and November. Still enjoying warm sunshine, it didn't seem like Christmas was coming, even though the days were getting shorter and the nights were growing longer. In fact, some people suggested that the reason we sold fewer burgers this year than usual on Guy Fawkes Night, was that it wasn't cold enough to make people want hot food to warm them up.

Mainly, I think, it was that we were all focused on our commemoration of the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Armistice which ended the fighting in the First World War. There was all the planning to do and then there was the day itself. In Halling, as all over the country, large numbers of people participated in diverse and moving commemorations. There were the figures representing First World War soldiers, the poppies on the lamp posts, the Field of Peace the children of Halling School made, the artwork created by Halling Sapphire WI and displayed at the lych gate, different village organisations contributing music and readings to the service in church, and the lighting of the beacon and the fireworks in the evening. It was gratifying to see serving members of the armed forces in uniform and to hear the bugled played at the war memorial, the traditional Last Post and Reveille. As always, the fallen were remembered by name, wreaths were laid on behalf of the whole community and we supported the poppy appeal, which helps to finance the vital work of caring for former members of the armed forces and their families. It was a particular honour for a large number of us to be present for the unveiling of a stone to commemorate Halling's own Sgt Thomas Harris MM VC. The day went well and thanks to all who took part, especially the Parish Council and others involved in the organisation.

So, Christmas! What's the link? Faith, hope and love. We need to make sense of things, to believe that there is meaning and purpose, despite the foolish and wicked things we human beings do and their consequences: on the international level, such as war and bad relations between countries; the problems which perplex and divide our own and other nations; and, closest to home, in the way we are all capable of mistreating one another and in the mistreatment we may suffer at the hands of other people. We need faith that God makes sense of our human lives, whatever may happen to us. We need hope that God is just and merciful and that, therefore, justice and peace will prevail. We need to know that God is love, that we are loved, and that we are called to love another.

The Christian belief is that God makes Himself known in Jesus Christ. Our Christmas hymns and readings proclaim Who God is, the One Who reveals Himself in Jesus. In Him, Christians will tell you, we find faith and hope and love.

Many of us will be dusting down the decorations or buying new, ready to decorate our homes for the festive period.

If you are using old decorations make sure you check electrical products before you plug them in for damage and loose wires. Be careful not to overload sockets especially if you're using extension leads - use this <u>socket</u> <u>calculator</u> to find out if you're exceeding the maximum load.

If you're buying new decorations this year then make sure you buy from reputable retailers. Fake electrical goods are not safe; causing electrical shocks and fires.

Inspect the packaging and item carefully - look for spelling mistakes

Check the plug – it must have 3 pins

Choose a reputable business – watch out for offers online that are too good to be true

(One in six people in the UK has bought a fake electrical item as a Christmas present)

Fake toys are made with cheap, nasty materials containing dangerous chemicals and flammable materials. They break easily and can be dangerous for children to use, especially those containing electrical components and batteries.

### Take your time & follow these top tips when buying toys:

Only buy from shops you trust – be wary of websites you've never shopped with before especially if it sounds too good to be true

Check the website is genuine – look to the left hand address bar for the padlock symbol

Look for the CE mark

Look for the BSI Kite and Lion quality marks

Check the packaging for spelling mistakes – do the instructions make sense?




