

HALLING WEATHER STATION

An amateur weather station situated in the village of Halling, in the Medway Valley.

OK I'm a weather geek, obsessed with weather, and why not, it can affect all of our day to day lives.

I've always had an interest in the weather, it must have been in some genes passed down from my father as he spent his RAF days a Meteorologist and had an interest in the weather right up until he passed away. Though it's fair to say, he wasn't as obsessed as I am, nor did he share my real love, which is WINTER! Give me snow and frost any day over hot and sunny weather....bizarre I know!

Collecting weather statistics started early with my father, as we took up an appeal from TV Weatherman Francis Wilson, who at the time worked for ITV on London Tonight. He sent out "Max/Min Thermometers" and every day we would ring in out stats from our house in Beckenham. I also carried on writing these temperatures down after Francis had left ITV for the BBC, but this mainly happened in the Winter, when the weather was much more interesting!!

Fast forward to 2005, technology had moved on and semi professional weather stations were becoming easily purchased, websites easier to buy and run.

So I decided to purchase a Davis Vantage Pro 2 and set up Halling Weather.

The original site was very basic, and as I have had no web design or computer training it turned out to be a steep learning curve. Luckily I came across some great software called "Weather Display" and a group of guys on a forum that had helped eek every ounce of the Davis Weather Station's potential. Including some complex weather website templates that were designed by an American who runs www.carterlake.org.

These then have further been developed and much of the site is a mix of templates and scripts from these various souces:

<u>CarterLake.org</u>, <u>Saratoga-Weather.org</u>, Kevin Reed at <u>TNET Weather</u>, <u>Mike Challis of Long Beach WA</u> and Ken True of <u>Saratoga-Weather.org</u>

The software is capable of real-time/live weather updates, as well as gathering statistics and collating them in various and hopefully interesting forms.

So we now have weather statistics for the village going back nearly ten years and the site complies to a high standard for accuracy, though the wind anemometer tends to under exaggerate wind gusts due to its placement. Also from time to time, the PC that gathers the software occasionally crashes or is down for maintenance!

The weather station and software records;

- · Temperatures; Actual, Hi's & Lo's and Windchill effects
- Wind; Average Speed, Gust Speed, Direction and Current Speed
- · Rainfall; Totals for Month, Day, Hour including hourly rainfall rate
 - Barometer; Current reading and trends

And coming soon, thanks to Halling Association, a Solar Sensor to record solar radiation which hopefully the software can use this data to record sunshine hours here in the village.

Just as an example of some of the stats, the village temperature records since the station began are:


High: 34.8'c 22nd July 2013 Low: -8.8'c 20th December 2010

Whoever Heard of Advent?

I'm not sure when I first heard of Advent. It wasn't a big deal when I was a child. I believe that we had an advent calendar in first year junior school with little doors to open every day until Christmas, each of which had a religious picture behind it. I can't remember an advent wreath in church until the early sixties. I think they were fairly new to England then. There was a lot of evergreen foliage around a ring with four large red candles, one of which was lit on each of the four Sundays before Christmas. I have an idea that it was hung from the ceiling and you had to stand on steps to light it, but I might be wrong. It was a long time ago and I was only a child. At some point (Sunday School? Confirmation Class?) I must have learnt that Advent Sunday is the first day of the Church's year. Advent Sunday is the nearest Sunday to St Andrew's Day, which is the 30th November and easy for me to remember as it is my birthday. This year I shall be 60 on Advent Sunday and all my friends reading this may take it as an invitation to join me to celebrate at Evensong at 6.30 pm at St Michael's, Cuxton, followed by a party in the church hall. (By party I mean pleasant conversation around a buffet and a few drinks, possibly with a little background music, not going on too late.) presents please.

When I was a little older, as a teenager, I remember taking Sunday School myself and explaining that the name Advent comes from the Latin word for coming and, in Advent, we think about Jesus coming again at the end of the world to judge the living and the dead as well as preparing for the annual celebration of His first coming, born in the manger at Bethlehem.

I think far more people know that Advent is the period leading up to Christmas nowadays than used to take notice of Advent years ago. This is because Advent has been seized on as a commercial opportunity. The chocolate Advent calendar is one more product to sell in the orgy of commerce and consumption which is Christmas. In fact Advent is swallowed up (literally?) in the Christmas season with Christmas decorations, Christmas carol services

and Christmas dinners filling all the first four weeks of December and sometimes stretching back into November and even October. It does seem to have been forgotten that Advent is supposed to be a time of reflection, even of fasting and abstinence, to prepare for the Coming of the Lord. In church you will find that theme in the readings appointed for Advent and in the fact that the liturgical colour is purple and in the choice of hymns and prayers. Outside church, it might seem like it is Christmas already from the beginning of December onwards and that eating your children's way through their advent calendars is just part of the Christmas festivities.

So why not? Does Advent have a point in its own right? Is it worth keeping as a preparation for the Lord's Coming, rather than simply being gobbled up by the season of Christmas? The theme of the Coming of the Lord is judgment. It is sheep and goats time. Jesus tells us (Matthew 25) that humanity will be divided into two. The sheep will be those who have treated other people well. The goats will be those who have shown no concern for others. On the Day of Judgment, it will turn out that the way we have treated other people is the way we have treated Jesus. What we shall receive on that day is what we would expect to receive if we have, on the one hand, honoured the Son of God, or if, on the other hand, we have abused Him by our ill-treatment of our fellow human beings, all of whom Jesus counts as His brothers and sisters. The Coming of the Lord is therefore something to anticipate with joy if we have faith and can look forward to entering into the joy of our Lord, but a cause for trepidation if we do not have that confidence. It is a time for reflection and repentance, for getting ready to receive the Lord with faith and hope and love. If not, what is the point of Christmas? How is Christmas good news if ultimately there is no justice? What does redemption mean if there is no such thing as God's mercy? Justice and mercy are two sides of the same coin and that coin is love and God is love. Advent and Christmas are not one, but two facets of the same indivisible and eternal truth. HALLING SCHOOL REMEMBERS

At the end of the summer term, some of our Year 6 children visited the War Memorial in the village and took a note of all of the names listed on it. They also looked for war graves in the cemetery before returning to school. Back in the classroom, they were able to hunt through the original school registers for the late 19th and early 20th century to find entries for those ex-pupils who lost their lives during the First World War. Our children were able to see where these people lived, the names of their parents and siblings, and the date that they started attending Halling School. This research, coupled with the end of year production in July (A Letter From the Trenches), enabled our current pupils to begin to have a real connection with those listed on the memorial; they could associate a list of names with real people who were once children like them, living in their village.

Throughout this term, learning about this important part of their history has continued. Our children have produced art work, poetry and other writing that reflects a dawning understanding of the past and its reflections on the present. Pride of place goes to our beautiful wall-hanging: *Halling School Remembers*. This piece of textile artwork features a poppy for every child (made by that child) and every member of staff at the school. Miss Cordingley designed and organised the project and a dedicated group of mums also completed some of the stitching. *Halling School Remembers* is currently on display in the church but will return to the school before Christmas.

Many of you will have listened to our children singing at the community centre on Remembrance Sunday – some upbeat songs associated with WW1 along with a poignant rendition of "We Will Remember Them", sung with real feeling. This event also featured a display of children's work.

Halling School takes pride in its involvement in the local community and we all enjoyed the excellent event organised by the Parish Council on Remembrance Sunday.

We made poppies and I bought a poppy and I could remember those boys. Some boys pretended to be sixteen and they went off to war and they died. Lily Lock (age 6)

Dear mum, dad and Dave,

It feels like I haven't seen you in years. How long has it been actually? Well, I've been in the trenches long enough to know that conditions are terrible. The food is poor here, we have bully beef, jam and bone-hard biscuits. Those biscuits are so hard I have to smash them with a bayonet! (Tate Beacroft age 9)

I can't sleep. Dead bodies, bombing, blood and guns have haunted me and my thoughts. The whistling wind is howling on my back and I can hear the barbed wire swaying. I want to go home to mum and dad and snuggle up in my cosy bed. This is no game. I hate war. (Corvin King age 9)

All was silent and calm. Not a noise to be heard on the frozen no-man's land. Could that be a bomb in the distance, exploding into a mass of rubble or a simple flare? The dead branches of the injured trees looked over the boys that would not see the light again. (Evie Pullinger age 9)

HALLING'S MARSHES AND FOOTPATHS

If the impression was given in the September Halling View that cattle would be off our marshes — Halling Common — for longer than 2014, I am sorry. The damage caused to our footpaths simply had to be rectified this year, after an exceptionally wet end to 2013. We may expect to welcome back cattle on Halling Common next year.

Even with new fences and gates in place to keep cattle off the first part of footpath RS319 at the Maximillian Drive end, and the first part of RS320 to the left of the gate in Marsh Road, there is still plenty of mud. This is solely the result of human 'foot fall' - but it is an excellent indicator that more people have been able to walk the footpaths now that repaired stiles with lifting top bars are easier to climb over. Would that we didn't need stiles at all, but grazing cattle are necessary to crop the grass, and they need to be contained. Big thanks are due to Martyn Court of Total Property for the erection of fences, repair of stiles, and installation of gates, and for his ready willingness to meet particular needs of walkers and their dogs. The balance had to be struck of getting dogs of all sizes past the stiles, and not letting cattle and their calves escape.

It's easy to say "don't be frightened of the cattle" – though, admittedly, some can be 'frisky'. Just shout and wave your arms! But cattle with calves should be given a wide, wide berth, with even the best tempered and most obedient dog kept under control. Naturally, cattle with calves will be fiercely protective. Cattle can also be inquisitive – they mean no harm – even though they are

naturally placid creatures. I recall the wonderful sight of my younger son studying for his 11+ examinations with his back leaning against the huge bulk of a cow equally contentedly at rest in the sun on the marsh river bank. Alas, progress is slow in getting permission from Lafarge

for a 'permissive' path on the west side of the by-pass to link Whitings Farm and the Plough Path (formerly it was a 'permissive' path, with no need to cross and recross an increasingly dangerous by-pass), and a path across Cemex property to link the marsh footpaths with Formby Road. As I wrote before, villagers could once cross the railway line to link the marsh footpaths with Stake Lane and Formby Road.

Clearance of fallen trees, bushes and protruding brambles (still growing in a warm October) has been done on the Plough, Cam, and Ticker Paths. Why the name 'Ticker'? I am told that 'tick' 'tick' was the sound the pipes made when water was pumped to cottages long ago demolished.

My thanks to some brave souls who have volunteered to help - when their work permits — to cut back foliage once Spring starts to overwhelm our paths again. Are there more volunteers I might call on when needed? bar.bar@btinternet.com

Next time, I'll talk about the footpaths that lead away from Halling and on to Snodland*, Cuxton*, Lower Bush, Great Buckland, Holly Hill, Vigo Village*, Cobham*, Harvel*, Luddesdown* and Trottiscliffe*. Those place names marked * have pubs....... but you'll need to be able to walk back.

The last year has been a particularly busy one for the Halling Association with several new projects being supported, along with a number of successful annual events being repeated for another year.

In early 2013 funding was approved to assist in fixing a leak and clearing the pond at Halling Primary School. After initial works to repair the pond were unsuccessful, additional works were undertaken and through the autumn the pond was finally made watertight. The final landscaping works around the pond were completed earlier in the spring this year.

Around about the same time the pond works were approved, the first of 2 Halling Youth Club 'Skate Days' with Team Rubicon were supported. The first event in 2013 was so successful it made it to the local newspapers! A second event has now been agreed, with Team Rubicon making a return for the summer of 2014.

Another event supported by the Halling Association that has been a great success is the annual Fun Week. This years' event in June took a new guise as 'Halling Fayre'; with a helter-skelter, dodgems and a flip-flop flinging competition among the many activities available.

The Halling Association also helped fund the annual Christmas tree for 2013 and the purchase of a new set of lights!

Other projects supported throughout the year have included providing a new hot water boiler at the Jubilee Hall, funding towards some tree works around the Community Centre, a new set of display tables for the Halling Gardening Society and a solar radiation sensor for the ever popular Halling Weather website: www.halling-weather.co.uk.

Another project supported that is well worth mentioning is the local PCSO, Kim Kitterhing. Kim's role is to help protect the 'Medway Gap' and the Kent Downs Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, maintaining a safe and tranquil natural environment for everybody to enjoy.

More recently, the Halling Association have started to support Halling Football Club, and also provided funding for the fireworks at the First World War commemorative event in November.

A rather exciting project to look out for will be the ice rink in December!

The work doesn't stop there, the Halling Association is always open to new ideas and projects to undertake that enhance the village and benefit the Halling community. If you have any suggestions for any projects you think are worth consideration, please get in touch!




