The final community event was the Christmas Sleigh Run, yet again, run by Halling Primary School PTA. Little did we know that after this we would be deluged by not stop rain leading to flooding on the marsh, which seemed to be a god send after the pictures of Maidstone on Christmas Day.

The stormy weather blowing through the country did not leave Halling alone for long, as was testament when a large fir tree came down at The Five Bells taking out power to half the village and blocking the High Street. The community spirit to cut the tree down to manageable pieces and the offers of help by many members of the Parish showed that the flicker of community spirit is still evident.

The only negative points are the continued inconsiderate parking by

many which is making driving and walking hazardous. This has not been helped by the recent road works that have made Halling gridlocked during the evening rush hour. The disgusting behaviour of inconsiderate dog owners is a major problem in this small village and is giving a bad name to all the responsible owners. This behaviour carries an £80 fixed penalty notice and a further fine of up to £1,000 for persistent offenders. If you see an owner not picking up their dog mess or want to report an area where dog fouling is constantly taking place, please inform Medway Council on line or by dialing 01634 333333. Kent Police can also issue on the spot fines if you can provide proof. All it takes is one resident to be fined and the message will get through that dog fouling will not be acceptable in Halling. If you choose to own a dog, then you should accept the responsibilities that go with that choice.

The Wild Side of Vicarage Road

That winding and yes, somewhat bumpy road connecting Upper and Lower Halling is home to some of our most colourful residents. The verge here is a 400-metre chalk grassland site and is one of 146 Roadside Nature Reserves across Kent managed in partnership with Kent Wildlife Trust KWT) and Kent Highways. The project began in 1994 and now includes over 60 miles of roadside habitat. These reserves can link or add a buffer to existing wildlife areas, helping to reconnect and restore specific conditions native plants and animals require. The site is regularly monitored to demonstrate the effects of the management applied.

The Upper Halling site was first designated in 1996 for its range of chalk grassland flowers, in particular, clustered Bellflower, which is nationally rare and only occurs in one or two other places in Kent.

In 2005 a paid contractor cut encroaching scrub on the steep bank. Since then, KWT volunteers cut and rake the site in the late autumn after seeding is completed.

Shrubs and trees are removed as well as the non-native Buddleia to allow full sun on the site. Hundreds of clustered Bellflower, Man Orchid, Pyramidal Orchid, White Helleborine and small Scabious can be found. The diversity of flora attracts many different creatures. Common lizard, rare moths and butterflies and even a green woodpecker have also been spotted here recently.

So next time you have to get between Upper and Lower Halling, why not walk along the footpath at either the top or bottom of the verge, sit on the bench and look for some of our wild neighbours.



The Church Clock and Three Phases of Physics

The tower clock is powered by a system of weights which are raised once a week by turning a handle which is quite hard work. If the clock is not wound regularly, it stops. This illustrates the common sense or Aristotelian version of physics. Things stop moving unless some force keeps pushing them. That is why you have to put petrol in your car or keep on pedalling when you are riding your bike. Common sense religion blends nicely with common sense science. If you need some force to make things happen and keep on happening, it is not hard to think that the force in question might be God. God keeps things running. He makes them happen. He can make them happen differently if He wants to (perhaps in response to prayer). This is the common sense view. Aristotelian Physics lasted for thousands of years and most of us still live most of the time as if Aristotle got it right.

Isaac Newton, however, discovered that this common sense view is wrong. Moving objects don't need the application of force to keep them moving. They just keep moving unless some force causes them to slow down, speed up or to change direction. Friction is usually the reason why moving objects on earth just slow down and stop if no force is applied to keep them moving, but, in a vacuum, moving objects just keep on Newton's theories are the basis of classical physics and basic engineering. You can see the clock mechanism in the church tower, a wonderful piece of Victorian engineering, based on the principles of classical physics. If it weren't for friction the church clock would just keep on running without ever needing to be wound up. A classical scientist, working on Newtonian principles, might think of the whole universe as a giant mechanism. Everything that happens would be dependent on what went before in a possibly endless chain of cause and effect. The universe would be internally consistent. Everything that happens would in principle be predictable. There would be no need of any force applied from outside the universe to make things happen. Your snooker balls would just keep rattling round the table until they disappeared into the pockets without any need for a man with a cue after the first break. Some classical scientists, thinking along these lines, develop a kind of naive arrogance. It looks to them as if there is no place for God in the universe. He is not necessary. No external forces are necessary. Maybe God created the universe in the first place and wound it up, but He isn't involved in its every day running. On this view, there are no miracles and prayer is largely pointless. Even the classical scientist, however, would probably want to pause before writing off art, music, romance, human creativity and religion as fully explained by physics. The rainbow means much more than a demonstration of the way light rays of varying frequencies are refracted by water droplets.

And now I'm going to cheat. Because it's difficult to see all four faces at the same time to put them right, sometimes you see a different time depending on where you are standing when you look up at the clock. This makes me think of Einstein and Relativity Theory. Much, if not

everything, depends on the perspective of the observer. Reality is very much harder to grasp than Aristotle or Newton imagined. There is always uncertainty, always unpredictably. Weirdly, it is impossible to know when a radioactive nucleus will decay, but it is possible to measure the half life – when half of any given sample of nuclei will have decayed. You can predict when half the nuclei in a sample of Uranium will decay, but you can never know which half until it has happened and been observed. Quantum Theory and Relativity Theory give us a much less predictable universe, a universe which still makes sense, but which is much harder to make sense of. The way things are apparently depends on the observer, but most events have and have had no human observer. Could the indispensable Observer be God, the one without whom there can be no physical reality? Given the essential mysteriousness of reality uncovered by modern physics, maybe we should be more humble. If the universe depends on the Mind of God and if our minds maybe united with His Mind by love, miracles are perhaps not so unlikely and the effectiveness of prayer may be very far from improbable.

Be that as it may, what Halling Church really stands for is not principally the mysteries of this world which are rightly and profitably investigated by Science, but the Truth of eternity revealed by Jesus Christ our Lord, which is available to anyone who approaches in faith scientist or not.

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

"There is no such thing as bad weather, just inappropriate clothing". This is a motto that the Early Years Foundation classes abide by at Halling School and one that we increasingly try to apply throughout the school. You may have seen the wonderful photographs of our Forest School in the January edition of Medway Matters and the article explaining why we are passionate about making the most of the outdoors to support learning. Our children in the Foundation Stage and Year One have an afternoon each week outside in our wild area. This happens all year round, whatever the weather. Activities include: shelter- building; nature art; cooking; making mud sculptures; whittling with potato peelers; making wooden pendants; hunting for mini-beasts; learning about plants and trees etc. These activities really support children's physical development (climbing, running, carrying, digging), social skills and wellbeing. They learn communication skills, problem solving and knowledge and understanding of their local environment. Forest School is extremely popular with the children and with parents:

"It's a great way to get children to learn about being outdoors and how much fun can be had from the environment around us. Also great for teamwork. I really enjoyed my visit and was very impressed."

In preparation for the introduction of the new National Primary Curriculum in September, we asked all of our pupils, through the School Council, how they like to learn. The responses include many references to learning outside the classroom: within our own school environment and the local community; through school trips; through visitors to the school. It is with these views in mind that we are building our new curriculum and looking forward to really making the most of our environment and our community.

The school is very fortunate to have excellent outdoor facilities including a wooded area and a large wildlife pond. The pond was recently re-lined by the Medway River Valley Partnership with funding from The Halling Association. Our extensive grounds are home to, or frequently visited by, a range of wildlife including: green woodpeckers, greater and lesser

spotted woodpeckers, newts, frogs and toads, grass snakes, lizards, foxes and rabbits (we are not so keen on the rabbits who make holes in our playing field!).

We also have easy access to the river with far-reaching views to support geography studies. The village's rich and varied past makes the study of local history relevant and exciting for our children. As we plan to mark the 100th anniversary of the First World War, we will be looking through the school's artefacts (head teachers' log books and registers dating back to the early 1900s) to find reference to past pupils who are named on the village war memorials.

There have been many changes to education, and to Halling School, since those early days and we are about to enter another period of change as we await confirmation of Medway Council's plans to extend the school over the next few years. Approaching this exciting phase, we are determined to keep in mind that our school is, first and foremost, a village school and must remain so, at the heart of the local community.

On Thursday 24th April, we will be holding our annual Marie Curie Afternoon Tea. You are invited to join us from 2:15 to view the beautiful daffodil display on our Field of Hope and to purchase refreshments in aid of Marie Curie Cancer Care. We look forward to seeing you.

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
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
