Welcome to the January 2016 edition of Story of the Month which features a task day held by the Halling Greenspace Volunteers.

Coinciding with the first day of the UK's National Tree Planting week and the start of



the Climate Change Conference in Paris, The Trust for Conservation Volunteers (TCV) teamed up with Medway Council's Urban Parks and Green Spaces Forum (MUPGSF) and the Halling Greenspace Volunteers to plant two trees in the lower recreational ground of Halling Parish. Eight people helped on the cold Sunday morning of November 29th, 2015 and the event finished with a Christmas lunch in the village pub. This was the 10th volunteer task day in the village since the Halling Green Space Volunteers was founded in September 2013. A total of 320 hours have been contributed by the group planting trees, litter picking and general caring for newly planted trees.

HALLING'S MARSH AND FOOTPATHS

HALLING'S MARSH AND FOOTPATHS

On this occasion, I have been asked to include the Chairman's MARSH report with my footpaths' report. "I had a site meeting on Saturday, 23rd January, with Cllrs Herbert and Hitchcock, and the co-opted Footpaths Officer, Barry Barnes. We were there to inspect the 'no man's land' state of the south/Maximillian side of the marsh which forms Halling Common and belongs to Halling Parish Council (HPC). Ever since its purchase by HPC, the marsh was intended for easy public access, and a village open space. Now it is evident that public access can only be made by determined effort. We needed to negotiate a barbed wire fence the length of Marsh Road to the river, a wired-up gate, man-made 'duck-scrapes' (ponds), slime round a cattle trough, and churned up trenches of mud. The new 'Four Dogs' footpath has been trampled by cattle in the short time they were on the south side of Halling Common. The meeting helped make clear on which part of Halling Common the Council might permit cattle to graze from April. If the south/Maximillian side is to be improved, cattle grazing might need to be confined to the north side only of Halling Common. Of course, there will be cattle on the marsh - in keeping with tradition - but on the north side the cattle will be kept off the RS320 footpath by wire fences already in place. I suggest that a 'north side only' solution would cost Halling Parish Council not a penny.

We were all shocked to find that a sink-hole had opened up in the NW corner of the north side of Halling Common, a hole big enough to entrap – or worse – a child or dog. *Total Properties* were commissioned immediately to fence off the area, and this has been done. The cause of the sink-hole is two-fold: an underground drain to clear surface water from the higher fields has demonstrably broken; and an adjacent natural drainage ditch has been blocked, with resultant back-pooling of water near the sink-hole. The Clerk awaits a report from Southern Water: I suggest that the ditch is cleared by a small mechanical digger to let water again take its natural course to the river. I look forward to working with Cllr Herbert and others about what might be done about these problems, and at what cost". (Cllr George Wenham)

PERMISSIVE PATH FROM FOOT OF PLOUGH PATH TO WHITTINGS FARM

In reply to questions from mainly Upper Halling residents, I can say only that neither the Clerk nor I know of any progress. The first step of an application was properly made to Kent County Highways (Medway), but seems to have stalled. Perhaps our Borough Councillor for Upper Halling, Matt Fearn, can help us?

BARRIER GATE AT TOP OF CHAPEL LANE (RED HILL)

At the very top of Red Hill/Chapel Road, a barrier gate has been installed. It stops all but the most determined walkers from continuing along well-established paths that lead to the North Downs Way and Great Buckland in one direction, and Lad's Hill and Holly Hill in another. Until now, a felled tree trunk was sufficient to stop cars but not walkers. I expect to meet Medway Borough's Footpaths Officer, Adam Taylor on site soon. Usually, Kent County Council gives the landowner an ultimatum to remove such unlawfully placed barriers.

FOOTPATH 201 NOW DIVERTED THROUGH ST ANDREW'S ESTATE

Some residents of the St Andrew's Estate are unhappy that Redrow, the developers, have agreed to a footpath diversion (until 2017) that goes along a private road and over a private grassy area. I shall use the opportunity of meeting Adam Taylor to speak about this.

MARSH FOOTPATHS

Vandals have cut the rope loop that secures the gate intended to keep cattle out of the (expensively) protected area on footpath RS319 that starts near Maxmillian Drive.

What is of more concern is that cattle have had free access to our newly-won footpath RS320 where it crosses Wildfowlers' land. Cattle were moved there from Halling Common at the end of October, and kept there into December. Huge damage was done to the path. I am seeking legal advice which suggests that a landowner must not let his animals have free access to a definitive public footpath

Footpath RS320 starts to the left just past the marsh gate. The access steps and the first part of the path need attention. Cllr Herbert will confirm this. The steps need in-filling with more 'type 1'- grade stone, as does the first part of the path which first needs levelling to remove some very large mounds which are unnecessary obstacles.

Further, the first part of the newly cleared 'Four Dogs' path to the right of the marsh gate has been churned up by cattle. An attempted alternative route means negotiation of extensive mud round a drinking trough. Cllr Herbert suggests that some fencing is needed here, as well as more 'type 1'- grade stone underfoot.

My hope is that the Council will set in motion all that needs to be done to improve Halling Common and protect the marsh footpaths.

OPENING OF NEW HALLING STATION SHELTERS

Councillor George Wenham Chairman of Halling Parish Council formally opened the new passenger shelters at Halling Station on 26th February 2016. The event was organised by The Kent Community Rail Partnership and hosted by 12 children from Key Stage 2 (years 3 to 6), all from the school council with Mrs Donnelly, Head Teacher and Miss Fenson, year 4 teacher. The children initially involved are now in Year 7 at Secondary School.





PETERS VILLAGE – MAJOR ADVANCES IN 2016

Work on Trenport's all-new 1,000-home Peters Village community has reached a crucial phase.

The first houses are now being built by major UK housebuilder Bellway, and a date for opening the new road bridge between the east and west banks of the Medway will soon be announced.

The opening will also mark completion of the Peters Village transportation infrastructure, just over two years since work started in May 2014.

The two banks were last linked, albeit by temporary military Bailey Bridge, during World War II.

Its successor is grander and more permanent and bears a new carriageway, joining with the Snodland-Halling roundabout of the A228.

But this road also depends on completion of a new bridge spanning the north-south rail line between the river and the A228. Both new bridges will include footways and cycleways.

Trenport director Chris Hall said of the latest developments: "We are delighted that our first housebuilder is now onsite and anticipate announcements soon for others, taking up the further phases on what we believe is perceived as a premium development.

"It offers excellent jobs and communications potential for residents and a high quality of life, with its own village centre and shops, school, playing fields and other recreation facilities.

"The new Medway crossing is, of course, key to its success, offering easy access to the river's west bank and on to London and other important destinations via rail and road.

"When completed, around 2024, Peters Village will mark a dramatic transformation and improvement of a derelict eyesore - a brown field site that once housed the former Peters Lime and Cement Works."

The river bridge received full parliamentary approval recently after a visit by four 'ministers', from the pupils' parliament at Wouldham Primary School, where progress of the new structure has been followed enthusiastically.

The junior VIPs - Dolcie Bond, Harry Banks, Daniel Kemp and Finlay Ingle -were accompanied by school head, Carl Fitter.

Trenport has also just launched its second annual Tri-History Arts Competition – 'The River and what it means to me' – for primary schoolchildren in Wouldham, Burham and Eccles.

The schools' Year 5 (aged 9-10) pupils will compete for a generous £900 worth of prizes, comprising £250 for the gold prize and £10 for each of his/her classmates, £150 for silver, £50 for bronze and the chance to win voucher prizes for highly commended entries. The competition is called Tri-History to alert and inspire the children with three facets of the past at the Peters Village site: ancient history from evidence of Bronze Age, Ancient British and Roman habitation; social/industrial history from the more recent past,

notably the cement industry and the people who worked in it; and the diverse natural history that Trenport has worked hard to


conserve.



Nostalgia Isn't What It Used To Be

TV programmes set in the past seem to be remarkably popular. There's *Call the Midwife, Mr Selfridge, Mad Men, Downton Abbey* just finished - and *Game of Thrones* - which seems to belong to a fantasy Middle Ages, not that I've seen it. Why this fascination with the past? After all, many of us, if we had lived years ago, would probably (depending on the era) have been below stairs in the big house, hard-working manual workers in the fields, factory fodder or private soldiers, sent out onto the mediaeval battlefield without armour and with only agricultural implements for weapons. Even for the rich, life wasn't so great. It goes without saying that previous generations didn't have mobile 'phones or home computers, but we forget that, within the memory of many people alive today, lavatories were outdoors, many homes did not have an electricity supply and central heating only became common in the 1970s. Do you remember your grandmother putting on her coat to clean upstairs? Well into the twentieth century, the poor in this country could still go hungry and, even for the rich, there was nothing like the year round variety of foods that most of us enjoy today. Until the NHS came into being in 1948, those who couldn't pay might not get to see a doctor. If you were to go back to the days when physicians thought that blood-letting was a good idea and surgeons used neither anaesthetics nor antiseptics, you probably would have had a better chance of surviving most diseases if you didn't see the doctor than if you did. Until the early 1900s, cities like London depended on migration from the countryside to maintain their population because the death rate in towns was so much higher than the birth rate. Someone said that modern dentistry was enough to make him thankful that he hadn't been born any earlier than he was.

So why the fascination with TV programmes set in the past? Partly, I think it is because we like to see how much better off we are today – at least in material terms. I also suspect, however, that there is a feeling that we have lost as well as gained. I do enjoy seeing films made in England in the 1950s and 60s (when I was a boy) when there was so much more unspoilt countryside, there were far fewer cars on city streets and children could play freely in the woods and fields and the streets outside their homes.



I think we have this feeling that, in a possibly mythical past, there was a greater sense of community, that families were stronger and that the big issues we face in life were much less complicated. Knowing your place cuts two ways. On the one hand, it defines and confines you; but, on the other hand, you know that you belong and where you belong.

There are three things I really dislike about C21: the growth in motor traffic; the disappearance of the countryside under housing estates and motorways, etc.; and the growing intrusion of government (especially local government) into our personal lives. I hope I get my bus pass before they get around to making cycle helmets compulsory! Sometimes, I wish I could have missed all that by having been born a decade or two sooner. But then I would have had to live through the war and rationing. I wouldn't have had my appendix out on the National Health. I wouldn't have had the chance to go to university. I would quite possibly have been working in one of those major industries which collapsed at the end of the C20 making thousands of people redundant. I probably wouldn't now be playing with my own personal computer. You might think I would lament the decline in organised religion. I do, but that is in God's Hands and I know that we can trust Him for His Church, however badly people let Him down.

Which, I suppose, brings me to my point. There is no perfect age in which to live. Life on earth has its good points and its bad. We should be thankful to God for the good times. We can trust Him in the bad times. We ought always to acknowledge our need of Him. But what really matters is not this world of time and space. What really matters is eternity. Our eternity depends on God and our faith in Him, which is His gift to us.



Halling Baptist Chapel Open Day

Thank you to everyone who attended the Open Day held on Saturday 6 February 2016. Thank you for your show of support and the encouraging feedback we got from all. Here is a summary of the presentation:

Halling Baptist Chapel was built in 1898 by cement workers as a temporary place of worship for those of nonconformist baptist persuasion. Over the years, however, the building has fallen into serious disrepair, and the cost of bringing it up to standard, along with the ongoing running costs, is not good stewardship. The present situation at the church is encouraging, and the future looks promising.

Possible solutions to our dilemma are to replace our temporary 'tin tabernacle' with a purpose-built construction; to brick-clad the existing building; to sell the land and move to another site; or to sell the land and move to a community building. Since there are no funds available to finance a brand-new building, or even to brick-clad the existing chapel, and since the former fire station was put on the market, the church agreed that the most sensible solution would be to sell our present site in order to purchase the Fire Station.

If our bid for the Fire Station of £175k is accepted, we would seek to sell our present site with planning permission for two semi-detached houses, the estimated value of the land being £190k-£200k. The difference, plus an extra £43k approx., would go towards the cost of adapting the inside of the Fire Station, as well as covering the legal and planning fees, etc. The funds for the purchase of the Fire Station are already available, since we have obtained a bridging loan, which would be paid back when we sold our land. The purchase of the Fire Station would be subject to planning consent, of course.

We believe that we could bring a suitable use to the Fire Station for the benefit of Halling. Besides our Sunday services, some of the activities we would hope to run in the short- and long-term future, as personnel and finances allowed, would be community suppers to fundraise for community needs (a Spring Supper in the Community Centre on 19 March 2016 in aid of the lower recreation ground is already planned); Holiday Bible Clubs (one is being organised for 12-13 April 2016); a club called 'Impact' for young people aged 15-19; GriefShare (a support course for grieving families); CAP (free debt counselling); a food bank; and a café (in five-plus years' time), among other plans.

Activities that are already taking place include our Sunday School for children of primary school age; our monthly afternoon tea for senior citizens (second Friday of the month 3pm); our 'Christianity Explored' courses; our weekly Bible study groups; and our yearly charitable appeals (an orphanage overseas, child education overseas, and village hampers for Halling at Christmas). In short, Halling Baptist Church has been part of the community for 117 years, but we believe that there is still much that can be achieved, and we are keen to work for the benefit of the people in our village.

The possibility of Halling Baptist Church being able to purchase the Fire Station with allocated parking would enable those coming to our meetings to park without increasing congestion in the local roads. However, if we were unable to purchase the Fire Station and the funding required to replace our 'tin tabernacle' was unavailable, we would still consider selling the chapel site and perhaps moving to a community building for our Sunday services. Nevertheless, as a church, we would continue to strive for the good of the village by promoting the Christian values of love, justice and mercy, but we would obviously be much more restricted in what we were able to do in the village.



Especially if you are a thoughtless, irresponsible dog owner.

If explaining to a few dog owners in the village that it is the dog owner's responsibility to pick up their dog's mess then maybe this will help explain why you should ALWAYS pick up after your dog.

Dog faeces may contain parvovirus, whipworms, hookworms, roundworms, threadworms, campylobacteriosis, giardia, and coccidia. If left unattended, these parasites will contaminate the water, soil, and can even cause infection in both pets and humans (especially children). The microscopic Hookworm larvae can be passed to another pet or person directly through the skin or by accidental ingestion as can other bacteria.

Pushchair wheels and shoes spread faeces not only along our pathways but into our homes too.






