Electric Vehicle Charging and Rural Communities

People from 90 organisations – village halls and parish councils – attended a zoom event hosted by Rural Kent on Kent County Council's scheme to develop a network of electric vehicle charge points across the county on 15th June 2021.

As rural areas are less likely to be attractive to commercial providers, KCC (Medway are one of the 7 partners) are supporting the installation of charge points in village hall and parish council-owned car parks and other sites.

Tim Middleton, Transport Innovation Programme Manager at KCC, gave more details of how installation and management of the charge points would work, and how to apply to be part of the scheme.

Chenice Howard-Sparkes of Chartham PC and Nicola Greenaway of Ditton PC talked about their experiences so far. This was followed by a Q & A session.

Like every other organisation in the village, **Halling Gardening Society** has had a much disrupted 2020 and 2021 so far, because of the pandemic restrictions. Three regular Shows have had to be cancelled: Spring 2020, Summer 2020 and Spring 2021, but all hopes are now on the **Summer 2021 Show** going ahead on **Sunday 5 September** in the Jubilee Hall with a full schedule of classes for flowers, vegetables, cookery and art.

All was not lost though as the Society launched its new website at <u>www.hallinggarden.co.uk</u> and this has proved a great success as a showcase for members and other villagers to show off photos of their achievements in their gardens. The Society offered a small number of classes for photos instead of each Show, and also for Christmas 2020 decorations, and the outcome each time was a beautiful collection from local gardens. The gallery is still live on the website so if you feel like a cheerful wander over to <u>www.hallinggarden.co.uk</u> you'll be impressed.

It wasn't possible to hold an Annual General Meeting because of the pandemic restrictions so members were emailed the annual accounts and report and the committee was confirmed for another year. As soon as restrictions allow, members will enjoy a social gathering for an afternoon tea during the summer, and then start planning their showings for September.

Also on the new website at <u>www.hallinggarden.co.uk</u> are links for allotment bookings, other gardening organisations and a very useful guide to how to prepare your flowers and vegetables for showing. Take a read there and then think about putting in an entry to show off all your efforts in your lockdown garden!

Halling Gardening Society is open to anyone of any age interested in gardening. You don't have to exhibit in the Shows but they are fun events, not taken too seriously or competitively and you get a great kick from picking up a certificate for your efforts in your patch. Halling Historical Society by Philip Badman

The largest annual programme of talks and walks ever offered by **Halling Historical Society** went by the wayside after just one talk in February 2020. Eleven talks and the new activity of organised historical walks had been organised for throughout 2020, with three meetings especially for the 150th anniversary of the death of Charles Dickens in 1870.

Two highlights could continue though. The Society launched its new website at <u>www.hallinghistory.co.uk</u> and this has gone down hugely successfully, getting hits internationally as well as locally and throughout the UK. There has been interest from America, Japan, Australia and throughout Europe. The site is full of detail about the history of the village and its folk, all gathered in one place.

Read about our earliest inhabitant of 3,000 years ago, Halling Man (now residing in the British Museum!), and our most famous villager. William Lambarde, probably Shakespeare's lawyer, and holder of several high state offices. Look back on Halling as 'Cement City', find out about the Bishop's Palace, see maps of old Halling, and pictures of its oldest buildings. See the historical origins of the names of many Halling roads, including Maximilian Drive, Scholey Close, and several from Bishops of Rochester who lived at the Palace.

See the two fantastic historical video collections put together by Rod Kinslow and Stu Cunningham. The most hits are on the pages of reminiscences of local villagers, past and present, as a living history of Halling. Still more are being collected, so if you lived in Halling before 1980 why not jot down your memories to add?

The other major activity of 2020, though sadly deferred by the pandemic, has been a project to put an historic blue plaque on the house at 79 High Street where the village's World War 1 Victoria Cross hero, Sergeant Thomas Harris VC MM, lived before enlisting. Funds were raised from Harris family and the public, and the plaque is ready for unveiling but the planned ceremony has been on hold for over a year. It is now planned for 3pm on Saturday 7 August, which is three days short of 103 years since Thomas died so heroically on the battlefield on 9 August 1918.

Guests expected to attend include Thomas's descendants, an officer from his successor regiment, the Victoria Cross and George Cross Association, and the grandson of Lieutenant Upfold, who was beside Thomas as he died and who recommended him for the VC. Maidstone Museum will bring along Thomas's medals. Local builder MCL has kindly agreed to install the plaque free of charge and catering will be by Halling Sapphires WI for a tea party in the Community Centre after the unveiling. All this of course is if pandemic restrictions are confirmed lifted on July 19.

Halling Historical Society has been established over thirty-five years and has approaching fifty subscribing members and over a hundred Facebook followers. It actively works with Medway Archives Centre and Kent Archaeological Society. The plan is to relaunch a limited monthly programme of talks and walks from September so look out for details on the website or the Facebook page at fb:Halling Historical Society. No Annual General Meeting for 2020 could be held so the annual accounts and reports were emailed to members and the committee was confirmed for another year.

Halling View Summer 2021 Feeding the Wildlife

I was going to write just about feeding the birds in our gardens, but we also feed a lot of other animals too – some of them inadvertently. On Thursday mornings, there's usually a good scattering of rubbish where the foxes have helped themselves from the recycling. I do try to avoid myself putting any food items in with the rubbish, but then I've got a healthy appetite, a dog and a compost heap in a big garden. So I don't really have any food waste.

Quite a lot of people make a point of feeding the foxes deliberately. Most of us enjoy seeing foxes about and nobody likes to think of any of God's creatures going hungry. On the other hand, there is case to be made that foxes are vermin and ought not to be encouraged. If you keep chickens, you might well feel like that. Maybe they take lambs too. Some people are slightly afraid of foxes, not entirely without reason. I once knew an old lady who fell asleep in her deckchair in the garden and a fox came up and bit her for no obvious reason at all.

Rats are intelligent creatures and keep themselves clean if they are allowed to. I am told that they make good pets. I have no objection to rats in principle, but I would object to them indoors. So such food as I put out for the birds I put out in the morning so that it is eaten up before the rodents come out at night.

The birds in my garden have to put up with breadcrumbs. A family of blackbirds are ready for their breakfast watching my kitchen door most mornings. If you put out food regularly, they get used to the time they need to be there. There is a danger that the number of birds in your garden will increase if you put out food very generously and then go hungry if for any reason you stop. It is a responsibility!

When I had goldfish in a pond, they were always waiting for their tea around 5.00. It is not true that goldfish have only three second memories.

One person I know, who is much more generous than I am with feeding the birds, has a regular visitor, a blackbird with a broken leg. Maybe the food she puts out has enabled to survive. It seems bright enough and in no pain from the leg.

I also put out any fat I do not want (out of reach of the dog) which I suppose the birds or other animals take. We are warned not to pour fat or oil down the drains for fear of causing those fatbergs which block up the sewers.

A huge number of people buy seed and other food to put out for the birds. If you do, you get a much greater of variety of birds and larger numbers than if you do not. Years

and years ago, Amateur Gardening carried out an investigation into whether putting out bird seed protected your plants because the birds were too full up to eat anything you were growing for yourself or whether you just attracted more birds which would eat your crops as well as the food you had specially bought for them. The conclusion was the latter, but it was worth it because birds in the garden are such a delight.

There have been a couple of warnings. You need to keep the bird feeding area clean and move the bird table occasionally. Otherwise, rotting food and disease organisms build up and the birds start to die. Greenfinches especially have suffered from an infection (trichomonosis) they have picked up around bird tables, feeders and bird baths.

Also, if you put out one kind of food, such as nuts, the kinds of birds which eat nuts will grow in numbers but the sorts of birds which do not like nuts may be pushed out of the area altogether by the increased competition. Greater spotted woodpeckers like nuts. Green woodpeckers do not.

In the winter, when the ponds and puddles are frozen, I like to put out water for the wildlife. When I was a child, my father told me that it was useless to put out hot water because it freezes faster than cold. As I grew up, I was not at all sure that he was right, but it turns out that he was right (as in so many things). Scientists have been puzzling over why this is the case for decades and now they think they know. Anyway, winter or summer, we need to make sure that the water we put out for the wild creatures is clean and in a clean container.

Looking after the world, especially the living world, is a nice thing to do and it's good that so many of us want to do it.

It is hard to say where we shall be vis a vis COVID. We are holding Communion services at S John's on Sundays at 11.00 & Thursdays at 9.30 and at S Michael's Cuxton at 9.30 on Sundays & Wednesdays. We can do socially distanced weddings and christenings with a maximum of thirty people. We can have as many people at funerals in the church as can keep 2m apart. We are hoping to hold a barbecue at Cuxton Rectory on 10th July and XKids for children and their parents and carers at S John's on 24th July.
