As of the 22nd of June the community pay back team will also be starting to cut back the remaining foot paths and plough paths. (With a team of 8 people visiting fortnightly we do hope to have these under control shortly – please bear with us).



On 21st April 1998, Bo-peeps Pre-school opened its doors for the first time, with 3 staff members and 12 children on our register. We were very proud to celebrate our twentieth birthday with a party in the park for all children and their families.

Thanks to our dedicated staff, we have always risen to the challenges faced through legal requirements and consequently have many achievements to celebrate. Over time, we have participated in two quality assurance schemes - within our first five years of opening, we were awarded the Pre-school Learning Alliances Accreditation, and we were the first pre-school in Medway to be awarded the I CAN Early Talk accreditation, with a pass mark of 98.4%. Our Ofsted reports have always been good. Thanks go to all those who have contributed to our success over the past twenty years and for the support received from the community during that time.







Crime prevention – Remember the WIDE principle:

W Window locks on every window

- I Interior lights left on a timer when you are away
- D Double or dead bolts fitted on doors

E Exterior lights on a sensor.

Make sure your back door is locked if someone knocks at your front door. Sometimes thieves work together with one coming in the back way, while the other keeps you talking at the front. Crime prevention – Use timers so that lights, radios and TVs go on and off to indicate someone is at home.

Don't keep large amounts of money in your home. Keep it in a bank or building society where it is much safer

It is especially important not to let strangers into your home. Fit a door chain and viewer, and remember: Never give out personal details such as credit card information to strangers who come to your door or call you

Never let a maintenance or service man who has just turned up at your door into your home

Always check ID of maintenance men that you are expecting. You can check these details with their employer before you let them in. Some may use a pre arranged password system to protect vulnerable people but if you are ever in doubt ask them to come back when someone else is with you.

"Physicists 'PROVE' God DIDN'T create the Universe" by Jasmine Brown, 26, Masters Physics Graduate and member of Halling Baptist Church

How do you feel when you come across newspaper articles and television documentaries that claim the latest scientific evidence proves that God doesn't exist? These are undoubtedly clever people with a wealth of scientific knowledge and understanding - so maybe they're right!

I read an article like that recently: "HISTORIC DISCOVERY: Physicists 'PROVE' God DIDN'T create the Universe". I'm a scientist myself and I'd like to outline a simple but important idea which helped me, and I hope will help you, understand whether what they are saying is right.

In many articles of this sort the science is very interesting, however they say very little about God's existence. Let me outline a very common error which will underpin *most* people's claims that God didn't create the Universe. Broadly speaking, science pursues knowledge of the physical, material world. Scientists observe the world, take measurements, write down what they find and try to explain it. Scientific advancement in the past 400 years has been incredible, and the more we probe the more complex and intricate we realise the Universe is. But in a sense, that is *all* we realise - more and more detailed understanding of what exists. And here we meet the error of **confusing what's called 'agency' with 'mechanism'**. Science has everything to do with '**mechanism'** but nothing to do with '**agency'**. God is the **agent**. Understanding one does not, actually *cannot*, disprove the other.

Let me use the example of an iPhone - something most of us will be familiar with. Perhaps you even have one in your pocket right now. Imagine you took apart your iPhone, and went into the Apple store and asked an <u>expert</u> to tell you all she could about the phone. She sits you down with a nice cup of tea and starts by telling you about the sorts of things you can do with it: you can make phone calls, take photographs, check Facebook. Then she explains that it has a screen and it's powered by a battery you must charge. She then goes on to talk about electricity in the battery, the laws of Physics that mean the battery can hold a charge to power the phone. Maybe she even draws you circuit diagrams. She goes further and talks about the amazing complexity of the tiny silicon chip inside the iPhone that means it can be so small and yet capable of so much. You're amazed! And there are things about the iPhone that she hasn't even begun to speak of.

But then she says this, "So I hope you can see that we can actually understand the iPhone in quite incredible detail, so I don't really think we need Steve Jobs any more. I mean, he was a nice idea, but we know so much about the iPhone now that I'm not sure he even existed."

Confused? I would be! What a silly thing to say. Well whatever your feelings about Steve Jobs and Apple, you know it's ridiculous to think that understanding the inner workings of an iPhone could disprove Steve Jobs' existence. Here, things like electricity and silicon chips are 'mechanisms' and Steve Jobs is the 'agent'.

Well just reread that quote, but this time instead of 'iPhone' say 'Universe', and instead of 'Steve Jobs' say 'God'. This is the sort of argument you're really reading and as amazing as the discoveries of science can be—and I hope you do find some of them as exciting as I do—none of them can disprove God's existence. In fact the opposite is true. The Bible says, 'The heavens declare the glory of God; the skies proclaim the work of his hands.'

Therefore more we discover about the Universe the more we discover about God and the more reasons we have to praise Him. But don't just take my word for it! Investigate for yourself. Even better—come along to our discussion evening on science and ask your questions and give your opinion! Details below.

FOOTPATH NEWS

After a thoroughly enjoyable run of cutting and keeping open the marsh footpaths, I bow out with regret. Age comes into it, my wife insists that it's a job for a younger man, and my main helper, John Martin, has moved recently to Norfolk. John was the perfect partner as we kept the footpaths open together because he worked twice as quickly as I did!

For the 40+ years I've lived in Halling, I've walked the marsh footpaths and those further afield up, over and well beyond the hills and woods with old friends such as Ben Cook and the late Ted 'Bullet' Stevens. It was good and care-free walking on recognised footpaths. The care-free element changed in part when the northern part of Halling's marshes and some fields passed into new private ownership. The new landowner immediately closed a public footpath, the RS320. Local people did not take this lying down, and made their case so persistently that, finally, the *Government* appointed a Chairman to preside over two legal teams led by barristers, one of which represented Halling. Local people called as witnesses gave evidence that they had walked the closed footpath for up to 50 years: the approximate yardstick for a path to be recognised as a public one is that it has to shown to have been walked continuously for 20 years. Fortunately, we had photographs to show that footpath and stiles for walkers (and to confine cattle) had always been there. Halling won this (unnecessary) legal tussle after a three day hearing (with costs paid by the loser), but the closed footpath had become almost totally overgrown in the 8 years it had been barbed-wired shut. Muff Parker and John Coleman spent many bloodied days helping to cut through walls of wood and thorns to open the path, and then dispose of cut branches and foliage. This footpath won back for the village is, essentially, the Oemex complex – when it becomes the RS319 round the river to Maximillian Drive.

It would be gratifying if other – younger – people volunteered to trim the grass and cut back bushes along the footpaths. If this hardwon footpath was now lost to nature and neglect, it would be a tragedy, and the land-owner would have won.

HPC would be delighted to hear from volunteers. The email address is https://hallingclerk@btconnect.com The Parish Council has all the right equipment: a Stihl petrol-driven strimmer, a support-harness, and head-wear to protect the user's eyes and ears. I won't pretend that it's not hot work at times, and that flies can be a nuisance, but it's a job that needs to be done twice only in the growing season. Everyone who walks these paths could help (many do) by keeping the bramble shoots trimmed by carrying secateurs. It was John Martin and Andy Beman who helped cut open another neglected path which runs from the immediate right of the marsh gate to Maximillian Drive. We thought it amusing to call this new path 'The Four Dogs Path' because it was that many dogs John Martin walked.

I thank my various helpers, local people who have expressed their appreciation of our work, and HPC for backing me as the fight was won to enable people to walk the footpath across the land-owner's ground, and to link up with the riverside paths. Walk all these paths with confidence: the law is on your side. They are *public* footpaths, and will be shown on the next Ordnance Survey map for the area.

Good news is that HPC has plans to make access to the marsh footpaths easier for everyone by replacing, where practical, some stiles with wider, metal arc-kissing gates, and carrying out repairs to other stiles, steps and fences.

My parting wish is that HPC's and Medway Council's desire for a 'permissive footpath' from the bottom of the Plough Path to Whitting's Farm finds early resolution. Papers have long been ready for signature.
