Public Sector Bodies (Websites and Mobile Applications) (No 2) Accessibility Regulations 2018 – Update on Progress by Terry Dolby

There has to be a major change to the Parish Council Website before September 2020 due to changes in regulations about accessibility due to the Public Sector Bodies (Websites and Mobile Applications) (No. 2) **Accessibility Regulations 2018**, to give its full title which came into force on 23 September 2019. It aims to ensure public sector websites and mobile apps are **accessible** to all users, especially those with disabilities. The Halling Parish Council Website must be compliant by 23rd September 2020.

The existing website could not be made compliant so a new web site was required and the Parish Council set up the Media and Communications Working Group to carry out this task made up of two Councillors and two members of the public.

The Group documented the existing website and planned on paper what was required for the replacement. They looked at numerous websites and concluded that the Hugo Fox website fully met our requirements and that the structure was ideal to support the disability access that the new website was required to have.

Hugo Fox is used by several Parish Councils in this area and they have confirmed that they will be fully compliant by September 2020.

Our Web Master offered, at no cost to us, to carry out the initial setup of the new website if we decided to go with Hugo Fox which the Working Group did. He set up the new website using the paper design that had been produced and one of the Working Group members worked with him. Phase 1 of the development plan was to set up a Hugo Fox web site and to transfer over all the existing content from the in-use web site. A special link was provided to members of the Parish Council so that they could see the first version of the new website when testing was complete, and any feedback and comments received were incorporated.

The website went live on Friday 1st May 2020 and any feedback and comments received have been actioned.

Due to the design of the Hugo Fox website and the experience that the team now has we can build on what we have and over time end up with a particularly good website. The Working Group will be able to make changes now that the new website has gone live and our web master will be able to stand back but will be there as and when we need him.

The web site ownership has now been transferred from our Web Master to the Parish Council.

The web site that was in use had links back into a previous version of the website to access information that had not been transferred across to the inuse web site. This could not be allowed to continue as both web sites will have to be closed down in September 2020 as they would not be compliant with the Accessibility Regulations. To preserve all the historical information that was on the old website the Web Master provided a complete back up of the data from both web sites so that this can be revamped and put up onto the new web site as part of the development program. Some examples of this are the Halling Walks that we can now provide an OS based map as we now have the authority to produce these maps and the installation of Forge Green which is a part of the history of Halling.

The new web site that we now have will be compliant when Hugo Fox complete their program of improvements. There will now be a program of updates to improve the existing content of the new web site and a to add new content.

There is still work to be completed on the Phase 1 development and work is now also in progress on Phase 2 of the development which will include implementation of Google Analytics (this monitors the number of people that visit the New Website), the creation of a new domain (GOV.UK) and the implementation of the new specific email addresses for all Council Members and Clerks.

Covid-19 Mutual Aid

Local organising to support the most vulnerable in our communities

When we realised the impact that the lockdown was going to have on neighbours we mobilised ourselves and called for volunteers to put their contact details on flyers and distribute them to their immediate neighbours in Halling so that we could reach everybody – (especially those who don't use the internet) so that all residents had at least one local contact they could get hold of.

We were offering to pick up shopping, get urgent supplies or even just have a friendly phone call.

We soon reached a network of over 60 'coordinators' and managed to leaflet every home in Halling.

Each coordinator knew which of their neighbours we needed to help including shielded neighbours, self-isolators, elderly, housebound, NHS and keyworkers

We have a WhatsApp Group called Halling Is Here To Help and we put links onto the Simply Halling and Halling Neighbourhood Watch FB pages so that people could get in touch with us.

We set up 'The Halling Hub' using The Five Bells pub as the focal point for both food and cash (Just Giving) donations so that our coordinators could deliver FOC food boxes to all 'sheltered' and 'vulnerable' neighbours on a weekly basis.

We were also able to help keyworkers by getting their shopping for them so that they did not need to worry about doing it for themselves after the grueling shifts they were working. As well as the food boxes and The Hub we also set up Halling Essentials to help villagers who were having difficulty getting basic products such as flour, sugar, eggs etc. from supermarkets.

As life now slowly returns to some semblance of (a new) normality we have wound down the FOC (Free Of Charge) food boxes and are in the process of winding down The Hub but Halling Essentials will still keep going (see FB page) and we are still very much in existence to help neighbours who still need our support or may need help in the coming months.

Sergeant Thomas Harris VC MM blue plaque project

Halling Historical Society is delighted to have raised the necessary funds to install an historic blue plaque on 79 High Street, Lower Halling, which is the house from which our village World War One hero, Sergeant Thomas Harris VC MM enlisted in the army aged 22 in 1914.

Most of the money has come from Harris family members. The plaque is now in draft design, after discussions with the manufacturer. The Society will arrange a Saturday afternoon unveiling. However, of course this unveiling is in limbo during the current lockdown and must be put off until at least the autumn if not into next year.

The plan is to invite Harris family members to the unveiling, and all contributors, plus the Mayor of Medway, representatives of the Princess of Wales's Royal Regiment (successor to Thomas's regiment The Royal West Kent Regiment), the VC/MM Association, the Parish Council, our Medway Council member, Medway Archives Centre, Snodland Museum, Halling Gardening Society as a contributor, MCL, and the WI.

There will be a small tea party in the Community Centre to commemorate the unveiling. Halling Sapphires WI has kindly offered to help arrange this. The local builders MCL, have kindly agreed to fit the plaque without charge.

Unfortunately, the Society got it wrong in the original information about the appeal. Many of the several historical records, including military, refer to 79 High Street as Thomas's birthplace - some even say Malling or Snodland. This put the Society on the wrong track.

It is now known from family members, and the Society has also got a copy of Thomas's birth certificate from Medway Records Office, that Thomas was actually born at 5 Monarch Hill Terrace, Upper Halling, which was off the top of Browndens Road. The whole road is long demolished. By the 1901 census, Thomas had moved to 4 Malvern Terrace, which it is thought was along Essex Road, but not known exactly where (can someone help with more information?).

Then by age 18 in 1910 (but not known exactly which year?), Thomas had moved to 6 Manor Terrace, which in the late 1900s became 79 High Street, from where Thomas enlisted in 1914, aged 22.

The Historical Society will still welcome learning of Harris family members who can be invited to the unveiling gathering, so if you know of someone who has not contacted HHS please encourage them to contact hallinghistorical@gmail.com.





Buster by Roger Knight

I have been reading *Buster's Diaries*. Buster was the dog of the Labour politician Roy Hattersley. He came to the notice of the public when he (the dog, not the MP) killed a goose in St James Park, an incident which was considerably exaggerated by the press. So, you might have heard of Buster. In his published diaries, he tells the very funny story of how, from being a badly treated and neglected stray, he wound up living in a fancy house just near Westminster Abbey. There is the joy of meeting other dogs in the park, trips to the countryside, overnight stays in hotels, the challenges of living in a busy, built up area with far too many busy roads, and the mutual adoration there is between a faithful dog and the principal human being in his life.

Much of the humour revolves around Mr. Hattersley's attempts to discipline Buster. The book was written in 1996 at which time there was a popular theory of dog training which revolved around the idea that dogs are basically wolves which have never grown up. There had been a study of a group of wolves which were observed always to be competing for dominance. This led to the belief that you must keep showing the dog that you are boss, dominating him, putting him down, so that he knows that you are the pack leader – the alpha male (or, I suppose, female). There are two problems with this approach. One is that no-one who loves his dog can keep it up. Roy Hattersley certainly could not. Neither could I, even if I wanted to. I do not want to because it is a false premise that wolves and dogs are continually fighting for dominance. The group of wolves in the study this theory is based on had not known one another previously. That is why I do not call them a pack. They were strangers to one another and that is why they fought to establish a hierarchy. This is the second reason why the theory does not work. Better studies show that wolves which form a pack know one another and know their place in wolf society. Fights sometimes break out and the social order changes over time, but generally speaking, a wolf pack is a harmonious whole, a functioning social unit, which works, rests, and plays together. Left to their own devices, dogs will behave in much the same way. A dog living in your home will instinctively want to fit into the pack. You do have to make it clear that you are the pack leader, but it is not necessary to keep on reinforcing your dominance. His instinct will be to follow you.

The other thing to remember is that he is a dog with a dog's outlook on life, not a mini human being, and that he has his own personality which you need to work with rather than attempt to suppress. So, do not expect a big dog or even a small dog of a working breed to become a lap dog. If you get a dog, get one you can live with without crushing his own nature.

Reading *Buster's Diaries* reminded me of a book I read when I was a teenager, *King Solomon's Ring,* by Conrad Lorentz, an early student of animal behaviour. He was the one who brought to the public's attention the way that chicks will follow the first thing they see when they hatch from the egg, if not their mother hen than any other animal

or human who will give them a lead. He also noted that most species of animals do not fight with one another to the death. It is not in the interests of the species to do so! Yes, many kinds of animals will fight over hierarchy, over food and in order to acquire a mate, but it is never in their interest to fight to the death. It is not even in the interests of the victor to fight without restraint. If he is badly injured, he may not be able to get food or the wounds might become infected. So, in most species of higher animal, the vanquished will either run away from a fight or will make a gesture of submission which the victor will respect and break off the fight. Turning the other cheek when someone punches you is not just a matter of showing Christian forgiveness to the aggressor; he is less likely to hit you again if you submit or just walk away.

When this does not happen, it is often because of human interference. If your hens are really savage in maintaining the pecking order, there are too many in a confined space. Bad people breed dogs or cocks to fight and put animals in situations where they cannot run away. We do that accidentally when our dog is on a lead and another dog picks a fight. Usually (unless the other dog is really vicious, or you are on the road) it is best to let your dog go and let them sort it out between them.

Generally speaking, it is the interest of both the individual and the species, if animals refrain from striving after dominance or fighting for other reasons and co-operate in the interests of the pack. The same is true for human beings, but we do not seem to be so good at realising it as most animal species.

As I write this, we are still in lockdown. Please let me know if I can help you in any way. Please send me any prayer requests.
